Limit irrigation of ornamental landscapes and lawns to two days a week (before 10am or after 6pm) Mondays & Thursdays for odd numbered and numberless addresses, and Tuesdays & Fridays for even numbered addresses (except to ensure the health of trees and other perennial non-turf plantings.
